#### **Investigating Topics in Ethics**

This activity asks you to analyze an issue in anatomy and physiology using a framework that pushes beyond your own opinions. This framework asks you to think about the following three aspects of ethical decision-making:



- Me—How will this affect me? What will it require of me? What are my biases?
- Neighbor—How will this affect others? How is loving my neighbor involved?
- Knowledge—What do significant sources of relevant knowledge, including science and theology, have to say on this issue?

Find two online articles that discuss a current ethical issue related to the human body and that offer differing perspectives. Keep the framework in mind as you read the article and answer the questions that follow for each article:

Summarize the article in 2-3 sentences. What viewpoint is the author communicating?

What type of argument is the author of this article using (me, neighbor, science/theology)? Explain how this is evident. Does the type of argument work for the topic?

How carefully does the article use science and/or theology? (What other sources does you check to confirm the accuracy of the information?) Does it include questionable claims?	
Does the article take other perspectives than its own into account? What other perspectives does it consider?	-
